Project History

Normandy Boulevard is one of the primary north-south connector roadways in the City of Deltona. Portions of this road are more than 30 years old. Much of the pavement is past its design life and needs to be replaced. A Preliminary Engineering Study was conducted for the Normandy Boulevard improvements in 2003. A public hearing was held in September 2003 outlining the alternatives being considered and recommended roadway and drainage improvements. Numerous meetings and workshops have been conducted since then regarding the Normandy Boulevard improvements. In 2006, a bond issue was passed, providing funding for the project. Engineering plans were finalized, the project was bid in March 2013, and the contractor selection was made in May 2013.



Description of Work

The work on Normandy Boulevard includes:

- Reconstruction of approximately 0.60 miles of existing two-lane "rural section" roadway on Normandy Boulevard to a new three-lane "urban section" roadway. The new roadway will have concrete curb & gutter, bicycle lanes, center turn lane, and 5' wide concrete sidewalks. The improvements extend from Saxon Boulevard to Fort Smith Boulevard.

The Normandy Boulevard project will also include the following:

- Construction of new water mains and removal and abandonment of old existing water mains that conflict with the new storm drainage system. Water service connections will be switched to the new 16" water main.
- Construction of storm drainage pipes and structures.
- Two new retention ponds will be constructed, one adjacent to Lorraine Lake and the other adjacent to Lehigh Lake.



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
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Project Schedule



When and How Long?

Construction work on this section of Normandy Boulevard is scheduled to start in July 2013. We anticipate construction to take approximately nine (9) months.

The project will be constructed as a single-phase work zone between the recently completed roadway reconstruction at Fort Smith Boulevard southward to Saxon Boulevard. In order to accomplish the work, temporary pavement will be constructed on one side of Normandy Boulevard in order to maintain traffic while half of the new roadway is constructed. Upon completion of half of the new roadway, traffic will be switched to the new pavement and the remaining portion of the roadway will be completed. There will be shifting of traffic between the existing, temporary and new pavement as the work progresses.

The contractor will be required to limit the bulk of his construction work to the hours between 7:00am and 7:00pm, Monday through Friday. Heavy construction and temporary lane closures will be limited to 8:30am to 4:30pm to reduce construction noise early in the morning and minimize the impact to the local traffic during the morning and afternoon rush hours.

Project Need

The re-construction of Normandy Boulevard is intended to allow for better traffic flow through the neighborhood. The other purpose of this work is to improve storm drainage in the area. As previously noted, two ponds will be constructed to provide the necessary stormwater treatment and retain the stormwater volume required by St. John's Water Management District.

Dewberry | Bowyer-Singleton, a continuing services engineering design consultant for the city, is the engineer of record and will also be overseeing the construction administration for the City of Deltona. Part of their responsibility will be to keep residents updated regarding the scheduled work and progress. Residents will periodically be notified when construction activities are scheduled that may impact their property.

However, it will be the responsibility of each property owner to remove all irrigation systems, landscaping, light posts, or other decorative items that are located within the Right of Way prior to the start of construction. This list is not inclusive but used as an example. It will not be the City of Deltona's responsibility to replace or relocate any items onto private property within the Right of Way once construction begins.
